Changes in MySQL Installer 1.4.39 (2021-08-25)

Functionality Added or Changed

- MySQL Installer now uses the `my.ini` file to determine the location of a data directory, which permits MySQL Installer to recognize a new path if the directory path is changed manually. Previously, specifying an alternative directory path was permitted only during the initial installation of a server. (Bug #30433169, Bug #97263)

Bugs Fixed

- MySQL 5.6 servers could not be configured by MySQL Installer due to an error that prevented successful connection validation. (Bug #33191940)
- Individual product features specified during an installation performed using `MySQLInstallerConsole.exe` were ignored and replaced by the product's full set of features. (Bug #32055127)
- After performing a silent installation, running a CLI command such as `update` failed to initialize MySQL Installer properly for first-time use. This, in turn, caused the product catalog to not be found and generated an error. (Bug #28655573, Bug #92445)
- Attempts to run `MySQLInstallerConsole.exe` with the `-silent` command option produced onscreen prompting for user input. (Bug #24620263)

Changes in MySQL Installer 1.4.38 (2021-06-02)

Bugs Fixed

- An error during the upgrade of MySQL Installer could leave the installed manifest file in an invalid state, reducing the set of products or product versions shown in the dashboard. (Bug #32739817)
- Commercial MySQL Installer was unable to authenticate user accounts for access into My Oracle Support (MOS). (Bug #32710937)
- A server upgrade initiated from the command line emitted an error indicating that no targets were available for the installed version, however, the same server version could be upgraded by using the graphical MySQL Installer application. (Bug #32512265, Bug #102526)
- If a server was configured to use the Shared Memory protocol as the only connectivity type, the configuration setup failed because the protocol was not enabled properly. Similarly, the setup of a server configured with a combination of TCP/IP and Shared Memory was able to complete successfully, but it was not possible to establish a connection to the server using the Shared Memory protocol. (Bug #30336549, Bug #30351382)

Changes in MySQL Installer 1.4.37 (2021-02-28)

Bugs Fixed

- With MySQL Installer 1.4.36 updated to use the new manifest, the product catalog omitted the latest MySQL products. (Bug #32455076, Bug #102455)
- Skipped configuration of an installed server could produce the wrong steps during a subsequent upgrade. (Bug #32425659)
- MySQL Server installations finished without prompting for server configuration. (Bug #32299500)

- An attempted upgrade to a newer version of commercial MySQL Installer wrote an error (Could not find a part of the path ...) to the log after failing to create temporary directories for the downloaded MSI package. (Bug #30259844)
- MySQL Shell did not start automatically when the check box to start it was selected and the server was configured as a sandbox cluster. (Bug #29206015)

Changes in MySQL Installer 1.4.36 (2020-11-26)

Known limitation: If MySQL 8.0.23 products are not available for installation after the product catalog within MySQL Installer has been updated, select **Add or remove programs** from Windows system settings to uninstall the current version of MySQL Installer and then install the latest version from <https://dev.mysql.com/downloads/installer/>.

Known limitation: If the Product Configuration page does not follow a successful server installation, click the **Reconfigure** quick action on the dashboard to start the initial configuration.

Functionality Added or Changed

- Defaults set by MySQL Installer for the `innodb_buffer_pool_size`, `table_open_cache`, and `max_allowed_packet` variables were resized to align with the server default values. (Bug #31964555, Bug #91081)
- This release introduces a redesigned product manifest that MySQL Installer attempts to download when it first starts. MySQL Installer continues the attempt with each startup until the download is successful. An unsuccessful download of the new manifest reduces the installation and configuration of MySQL products to the current bundle only.

In addition, the automatic catalog update feature has a new default cycle of seven days to download the catalog (with the most recent manifest) when MySQL Installer starts and enough days have passed since the last check. Previously, the automatic update cycle was performed daily at a specified hour and it depended on the creation of a schedule task. The new automatic cycle (in days) is configurable. As part of this change, web packages no longer contain a manifest. If the automatic download is unsuccessful, an error is logged and only those products in `Product Cache` folder already are available to select for installation or configuration.

Lastly, this release splits the Select Products and Features page into two separate pages: Select Products and Select Features, which is optional. The Select Features page is enabled by selecting a check box on the Select Products page during a product installation.

Bugs Fixed

- Clicking the **Retry** control during a valid remove-product operation performed no action. (Bug #32010447)
- MySQL Installer permitted product features to be modified when the product MSI file did not support the action. Modifying or removing an essential feature with MySQL Installer could disrupt the expected operation of the MSI file. (Bug #30836109)
- MySQL Installer attempted to execute the Windows Firewall Rules step when there were no rules to remove for the server being uninstalled. (Bug #30165854)

- MySQL Shell shut down unexpectedly after a successful automatic startup. (Bug #29339047)
- Previously, MySQL Installer created a scheduled task to update the product catalog without seeking user input. The new behavior performs an automatic catalog update that is based on a configurable cycle of time and it runs during the MySQL Installer startup only. The automatic catalog update can be disabled. (Bug #21342584)

Functionality Added or Changed

- Previously, the MySQL Server installation included a feature named [Server Data Files](#), which was enabled by default. This feature was required to configure MySQL as a Windows service for older server versions. Now, the MSI file for MySQL Server 8.0.21 (and higher) initializes the server directly, without using the feature. Similarly, MySQL Installer 1.4.35 (and higher) excludes the **Server Data Files** check box from the Select Products and Features step when the MSI file omits the feature. (Bug #23154065)

- Support for InnoDB Cluster configuration within MySQL Installer is disabled. All configuration operations associated with a production InnoDB Cluster or a sandbox InnoDB Cluster (for testing) now can be performed using MySQL Shell.

Bugs Fixed

- An overlapping button hid the down arrow of the removed products list. (Bug #31595443)
- Terminology was synchronized to match related updates made in the Replication documentation. (Bug #31553941)
- An error was returned when an attempt was made to connect to the local MySQL server using valid credentials. This fix updates the MySQL Connector/NET component that is used to establish connections to the server. (Bug #31463373)
- The **Back** control was reactivated out of sequence after MySQL Installer began removing products. (Bug #30864435)
- After selecting an installed MySQL product to upgrade, the **Changes** link shown on the page was not active and did not open the associated release notes. In some cases, such as when upgrading Samples and Examples, the **Changes** link incorrectly indicated the presence of release notes. Now, the **Changes** link for each product is active and the link is removed when release notes are not available. (Bug #30397090)
- Links to the release notes of several MySQL products shown during the upgrade sequence produced an error when selected. (Bug #30397053)

Changes in MySQL Installer 1.4.34 (2020-05-18)

Functionality Added or Changed

- The MySQL Shell 1.0 release series is no longer included in the list of products available for installation. (Bug #31278698)
- The MySQL Router 2.1 release series is no longer included in the list of products available for installation. (Bug #31247437)
- Previously, MySQL Installer requested a computer reboot whenever the Windows service hosting MySQL was modified or removed. Now, unless another application is using the service, MySQL Installer omits the reboot request and performs the operations without requiring a reboot. MySQL Installer will continue to include reboot requests on behalf of standalone product MSIs. (Bug #30914429)

Bugs Fixed

- The prerequisite for installing Connector/Python did not specify which version of Python satisfied the requirement on the local host. Now, a range of supported versions is shown during the Check Requirements step, as needed. (Bug #31339874)
- MySQL Installer neither generated a list of allowed servers when configuring a production InnoDB Cluster that included multiple instances with public IP addresses nor did it warn about the requirement to do so. As a result, the cluster configuration failed.

Workaround: Configure the list manually by setting the `group_replication_ip_allowlist` (from MySQL 8.0.22) or `group_replication_ip_whitelist` server variable on the source before joining an instance to the InnoDB Cluster. (Bug #31328659)

- Some MySQL products were shown to be ready for an upgrade to version 8.0.20 before those products were released. The attempt to download them returned an error. (Bug #31201685, Bug #99313)
- The data directory from a previously installed MySQL 5.6 or 8.0 server could not be reused by a replacement server of the same release series and version (or an earlier version). (Bug #31112294)
- A mismatch in the recommended default recovery method, which was based on the server version, generated an error when MySQL 5.7.29 was configured to run as a sandbox InnoDB Cluster. (Bug #31069453)
- Members of an InnoDB Cluster could not be reconfigured to run as standalone servers with MySQL Enterprise Firewall enabled. MySQL Installer now ensures that each server instance is writable after removing it from a cluster and before starting the MySQL Enterprise Firewall configuration step. (Bug #31012535)
- An error prevented the creation of a sandbox InnoDB Cluster when MySQL 8.0.12 was the server version being configured. (Bug #31001751)
- A duplicate server ID being set for both the seed instance of a remote InnoDB Cluster and also for a joining server instance was not permitted and the action returned an error when the configuration was applied. However, if the joining server was part of local cluster first, before it was reconfigured to join, then undoing the join and dissolving the local cluster also dissolved the remote cluster. This fix prevents the setting of duplicate server IDs by adding early validation and it provides implementation improvements that reduce the possibility of an irreversible, failed configuration. (Bug #30982389)
- The Connector/Python product title included a version number, unlike the other MySQL connectors listed in the MySQL Installer dashboard. This fix updates the manifest to exclude the series title for Connector/Python 8.0, which was overriding the product title and causing the version number to appear in the `Product` column. (Bug #30963286)

- After changing the bootstrap port for MySQL Router during the reconfiguration operation, the applied change returned an error. The fix for this issue requires an upgrade to MySQL Router 8.0.20 or later. (Bug #30908352)

- On the first use of MySQL Installer, the **Check For Catalog Updates** check box was deselected when the default values were applied. This fix now also selects the check box during the reset. (Bug #30133439)
- MySQL Installer added the same Windows Firewall rule repeatedly without first deleting the previous rule (or rules) when reconfiguring a server with X Plugin enabled. Now, the reconfiguration step always deletes the existing rule first before adding the replacement rule to the revised server configuration. (Bug #28537144)

Changes in MySQL Installer 1.4.33 (2020-03-04)

Known limitation: There is an issue for MySQL 8.0.16 and higher that prevents the server from starting when the data directory from an earlier server version is reused for a new server installation. MySQL Server automatically initiates an upgrade when an existing data directory from an earlier server installation is reused and MySQL Installer does not process the upgrade as expected.

The workaround is to use the **Upgrade** operation in MySQL Installer, instead of removing the earlier server installation and then installing a fresh server instance that reuses the previous data directory. Alternatively, install a new server instance with the same version number as the data directory to be reused, then upgrade the server afterwards.

- MySQL Installer no longer discovers the following MySQL products and product series. All actions to these products, if they are currently installed, must be performed manually.

Products removed from the list of products available for installation:

Bugs Fixed

- The connection test performed after reconfiguring an existing InnoDB Cluster to be a sandbox InnoDB Cluster reported that the connection was unsuccessful, because an alternative port was used for the test. This fix ensures that the user-defined connection details are always used when testing a reconfigured cluster connection. (Bug #30830259)
- Previously, MySQL Installer included `plugin-load` entries in the `my.ini` server configuration file to install MySQL Enterprise Firewall. The file entries introduced errors in the server log during an upgrade when the loading operation was attempted. This fix removes the `plugin-load` entries from the file and now executes the SQL script supplied by the MySQL Server to create all of the supporting objects required to install the plugin. (Bug #30725039)
- A success icon was shown incorrectly after an attempt to remove a product failed and the operation included no suboperations. (Bug #30669574)
- Ineffective validation determined that all products set with `relatedVersion=8.0` in the products manifest were installed already when Connector/Python 8.0.19 was selected for installation. The error disabled the selection arrows for related items, such as MySQL Documentation 8.0.19 or Samples and Examples 8.0.19, during the Select Products and Features step. (Bug #30556167)
- A port number other than the default `3306` added an error to the log for a MySQL server instance that was installed using `MySQLInstallerConsole.exe` while another server instance with the default port was installed already. Now, the default port value can be overridden as expected and all ports in use already are identified. (Bug #30428696, Bug #97252)
- An issue with Connector/Python blocked the installation of other MySQL connectors and clients. (Bug #30377477)

- An exception was returned unexpectedly when the MySQLInstallerConsole `INSTALL` command was used. (Bug #30298310)

Changes in MySQL Installer 1.4.32 (2019-11-18)

Known limitation: There is an issue for MySQL 8.0.16 and higher that prevents the server from starting when the data directory from an earlier server version is reused for a new server installation. MySQL Server automatically initiates an upgrade when an existing data directory from an earlier server installation is reused and MySQL Installer does not process the upgrade as expected.

The workaround is to use the **Upgrade** operation in MySQL Installer, instead of removing the earlier server installation and then installing a fresh server instance that reuses the previous data directory. Alternatively, install a new server instance with the same version number as the data directory to be reused, then upgrade the server afterwards.

Functionality Added or Changed

- To remove an installed product, MySQL Installer often performs other tasks, some are nonmandatory. The overall product removal operation can succeed even when a nonmandatory task fails. For better clarity when a nonmandatory task fails, MySQL Installer now sets the operation state to `Completed (with errors)` and provides a reminder to evaluate the failed task. (Bug #30107754)
- Previously, the MySQL Installer prerequisite engine made assumptions about the forward compatibility of certain installation requirements. The engine now reads more detailed information from the Windows registry and also adds support for executing WMI queries. When applicable, products installed with MySQL Installer can specify the precise version of a requirement rather than relying on the forward or backward compatibility among versions.

Bugs Fixed

- Package rules were evaluated only during the initialization of MySQL Installer and not when a common prerequisite was added by another product. Now MySQL Installer checks relevant rules prior to displaying the Check Requirements wizard page and skips the step if, for example, the Visual C++ 2015 Redistributable for Visual Studio requirement was satisfied during a previous installation. (Bug #30483081)
- The **Finish** button remained disabled after MySQL Installer performed the steps to remove a product and changed the status to `Completed`. The operation was unable to continue to the Removal Complete page. (Bug #30482915)
- Links to the release notes of several MySQL products shown during the upgrade sequence produced an error when selected. (Bug #30397053)
- On non-English Windows hosts, MySQL Server 5.6 and 5.7 could not be uninstalled when the product was configured to run as a Windows service. An error occurred because the MySQL MSI attempted to remove the MySQL service after MySQL Installer removed it. MySQL Installer now provides a property to alert the MSI at startup that the MySQL service is gone. In addition, the Remove Service step now executes only when the MySQL service exists and it was created by MySQL Installer. (Bug #30357245)
- A newly created InnoDB Cluster instance could not be reconfigured (and recreated) as a new InnoDB Cluster instance because of a timeout condition on the operation. (Bug #30187962)
- Product prerequisites for MySQL for Visual Studio were not identified prior to the installation step, which prevented a successful installation. (Bug #30085609)
- In all cases, the connection test for MySQL Router failed with MySQL Server 8.0.1 (and lower) configured as a sandbox cluster. Improved validation now determines the role of a server within a cluster. (Bug #30058469)
- The **Next** button was improperly enabled when an invalid service name was entered on the Windows Service page. (Bug #29788953)

- My Oracle Support (MOS) passwords with special characters, such as a "+", were not escaped properly which caused MOS authentication to fail when attempting to install commercial products. And failed login attempts are now logged, for debugging purposes. (Bug #16724465)
- The upgrade process would replace a custom installation path with the default path. The installation directory is now stored in the registry, and is passed to the Installer during an upgrade. (Bug #16723442, Bug #16783415, Bug #69061, Bug #69060)

- MySQL for Excel failed to install on systems with Microsoft Office 2013, as MySQL Installer failed to detect Excel 2013 as a valid prerequisite. (Bug #16293188)

- The Installer would attempt to create a configuration file when the defined data directory did not exist. (Bug #16207721)
- If [INSTALLLOCATION](#) is passed in while executing the Installer, it will be used as the base directory for all binaries and data files that the Installer installs. - The Installer would not detect [VSTO](#), so would fail to install MySQL for Excel on systems that relied upon [VSTO](#). (Bug #15912606)
