2023 Budget Request: By The Numbers

- Total request of \$301.4 billion (Discretionary and Mandatory, includes collections and Transformational Fund), +\$30.7 billion (+11.3%).
- **Discretionary request:** \$139.1 billion (with collections), \$21.9 billion (+18.7%) over 2022 budget.
- Recurring Expenses Transformational Fund (RETF): \$968 million, for Construction
- Mandatory request: \$161.3 billion, +\$8.6 billion (+5.7%) over 2022 budget.

The 2022 column reflects the 2022 budget submission. The 2022 appropriations bill was signed after budget display for the 2023 budget submission was finalized. Minor differences between 2022 appropriated and 2022 budget are noted.

A Few Points to Start: General Trends in Budget

- 2023 Plan for American Rescue Plan (ARP) Funds: VA received \$17.1 billion in ARP funds in March 2021. Obligated \$657 million in 2021, expects to obligate \$12 billion in 2022, and the remaining \$4.3 billion in 2023. Today's brief focuses on 2023 base appropriation request, the shift of costs from ARP drives the 2023 request, especially in the Veterans Health Administration (VHA).
- **COVID-19 Response:** VA rose to the challenge of COVID-19, saving lives of Veterans impacted by COVID-19. The pandemic will continue to impact Veterans and VA in future years as demonstrated in the VHA request.
- **Health Care Inflation:** Health care inflation is a key cost driver for medical care having a significant impact on VHA.
- Recurring Expenses Transformational Fund (RETF): VA continues to benefit from RETF. The 2023 budget focuses on construction (\$968 million, +\$148 million (+18%) from 2022).
- Backlog of Benefit claims and appeals: Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) and the Board are continuing to reduce the claims backlog. This budget invests in automated solutions to continue the reduction. Backlog of Compensation and Pension claims is 243,925 as of March 22 (down from 260,669 on January 30, 2021, and up from about 70,000 in fall of 2019).

What's In and Out

A few notes on what is and is not included in the 2023 budget

- Impacts of Environmental Exposure: Includes funding for benefits and health care for three new respiratory presumptives (asthma, rhinitis and sinusitis) and rare cancers. Does not include additional resources for pending toxic exposure legislation (PACT Act, Cost of War, others).
- Asset and Infrastructure Review (AIR): Includes \$5 million for the work of the Commission (staff, travel, supplies, contracts). The Budget does not include funds to implement recommendations from the Commission's work based on the recent release.
- Caregivers: Review of program ongoing. 2023 includes \$1.8 billion for the Program for Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers, an increase of \$433 million (+30.6%) from 2022. More details in VHA.
- **Cancer** (includes moonshot and precision oncology): Includes \$81 million (+\$12 million from 2022), together with \$167 million within the VA medical care program, to support White House priorities targeting research and treatment. More details in research.
- **Human Capital:** Includes funds for RAISE Act, hiring initiatives, competitive pay.
- **EHRM:** Includes a revised rollout schedule while assessing the impact of 2022 appropriations of \$2.5 billion and \$200 million rescission on long term schedule.

- Continues VA's successful response to the immediate impacts and after-effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, including returning deferred care.
- Focuses resources on mental health and suicide prevention, programs to prevent Veteran homelessness, and expanded services for women Veterans.
- Expands VA's efforts to support family caregivers and Veterans suffering from service-connected environmental exposures.
- Invests in the recruitment, development, diversification, and retention of VHA workforce.

Factors Driving Medical Care Growth

2023 appropriated request of \$118.7 billion (excluding collections), \$21.3 billion (+22%) above 2022 budget, a historic increase in total funding and percentage growth, due in part to the following:

- A \$12.9 billion increase in the Enrollee Health Care Projection Model estimate of the care Veterans will need in 2023 and the costs to provide that care.
 - Modeled increases include sector-wide health care inflation, intensity, and utilization trends as well as the lasting impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - The model includes demographic enrollment changes and continuing growth in reliance due to the MISSION Act.
- A shift of ~\$7 billion covered by ARP resources in 2022 that will need appropriated funding to continue in 2023.

- Medical Services and Medical Community Care support increased health care activity trends in VA facilities and in the community.
- Medical Support and Compliance enables enhanced human capital support and ongoing system transformations, including the Electronic Health Record Modernization (EHRM).
- Medical Facilities funds necessary capital improvements and the staff required to implement them.

Medical Care Highlights

- Suicide Prevention: VA has made Suicide Prevention is VAs top clinical priority and VA is implementing a comprehensive public health approach to reach all Veterans. 2023 budget request of \$497 million will:
 - Continue Staff Sergeant Parker Gordon Fox Suicide Prevention Grant Program (SSG Fox SPGP) at \$55.8 million to for grants for community-based suicide prevention efforts.
 - Support transition to new 988 as universal telephone number for the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. Veteran Crisis Line 2023 request supports 2,568 FTE, an increase of 1,526 FTE over 2021 levels to meet call volume increase of 122% to 154% as a result of the new 988 number which must be complete by July 16, 2022.
- **Women Veterans Health:** number of women Veterans using VA services has more than tripled since 2001, growing from 159,810 to more than 600,000 today. To meet this growing demand, budget includes:
 - \$9.8 billion for all healthcare (+\$756 million from 2022), including an estimated \$767 million to support women's gender-specific care and women's health programs.
 - Women heath program office: \$134.2 million (+\$27.7 million from 2022) to support initiatives for gynecology, care coordination, maternity care, and staffing.

Medical Care Highlights

- Homelessness: To ensure every Veteran has permanent, sustainable housing with access to high-quality health care and other services to prevent and end Veteran homelessness. 2023 budget includes \$2.7 billion for homeless programs (all base funds, increase of \$409.8 million from 2022 base funds; 2022 includes \$486 million in ARP funding which does not continue in 2023), which will:
 - Hire an additional 140 social workers to assist homeless with healthcare enrollment;
 - Expand Veteran Justice Outreach to approximately 440 staff
 - Assist with design and development of housing partnerships for aging Veterans
 - provide grant funds for special needs for transitional housing in Grant and Per Diem program
- Caregivers: VA recognizes the important role of caregivers in supporting Veterans. 2023 budget includes \$1.8 billion for Caregivers Support Program, +\$433 million (+30.6%) from 2022. This will:
 - Support for both Program of General Caregiver Support Services (PGCSS) and Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC), including staffing, stipend payments and may other supports and services to help empower family caregivers of eligible Veterans
 - Enable continued processing of over 109,000 applications received since the launch of Phase I expansion in October 2020, which far exceeded the total number of applications received by the program in previous years, by 350%.
 - Support PCAFC expansion on October 1, 2022, to Veterans who served between May 7, 1975, and September 11, 2001
 - Funds additional 362 field-based positions to process anticipated volume of applications.
 - Operationalize VA response to Beaudette ruling which has expanded appeal options outside the VHA Clinical Appeals process

- \$916 million in appropriations for research (+\$34 million, +4%) increases investments in high priority areas of Veteran's health.
 - Total funding in support of Veteran research is \$2.3 billion, when coupled with an additional \$1.3 billion in federal and private grants and other support.
- Funding supports approximately 2,697 total projects, including:
 - Traumatic Brain Injury (+\$10 million from 2022).
 - Toxic Exposure/Military Environmental Exposures Research (+\$20 million from 2022).
 - Cancer Moonshot and Precision Oncology (\$81 million, +\$12 million from 2022).
 - Implementation of the Commander John Scott Hannon Mental Care Improvement Act (+\$5 million from 2022).

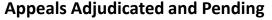

 - Compensation and Pension Claims Modernization to automate process from submission to authorization
 - Pension Optimization Initiative to reduce processing and wait times.
 - Veteran Transitional Assistance Grant Program
 - Disability Employment Pilot Project
 - Clean Energy Job Training Program in conjunction with Department of Labor

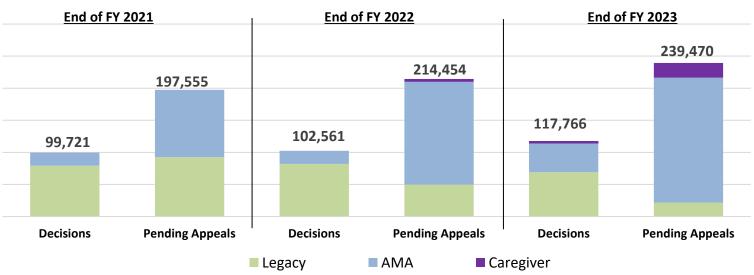

Health Portfolio

Highlights include:

- Community Care (\$141 million): increased automation capabilities for pharmacists and enhanced telehealth systems.
- Health Data Interoperability (\$104 million): Ensure continuity of operations for VA systems, which provides for the exchange of Veteran health information between VA and non-VA partners
- Digital Health Platform (\$51 million): Provides enhancement of the Clinical Contact Center, and new development for the Dental Care Workflow Modernization and Platform Evolution

Enterprise Portfolio

Highlights include:

- IT Infrastructure (includes HW/SW Maintenance and IT Support Contracts) (\$770 million): Supports modernization efforts in major initiatives such as (FMBT, HRIS, EHRM, Cloud, etc.).
- Infrastructure Readiness Program (\$477 million): Reduce Tech Debt
- Information Security (includes Cyber Security and Privacy & Records Management) (\$457 million): Modernize/Enhance high-level initiatives across the business partners such as, Identity Access Management (IAM), Continuous Readiness in Information Security Program (CRISP), Field Security Service (FSS) and Cyber Security Strategy.
- IT Service Management (\$95 million): Increase efficiency and productivity by utilizing a single web-based tool for multiple services and automate IT Service Management products and processes.

Benefits Portfolio

Highlights include:

- Veterans Customer Service (\$98 million): Enhance and maintain a single unified experience in a digital world across VHA, VBA, NCA and staff offices to meet customers' needs, currently impacting over ~20M unique users.
- Veterans Benefits Management (\$80.5 million): Supports the operation and enhancement of IT solutions which enable greater efficiency in processing claims by utilizing optimized business processes, the Benefits Integration Platform (BIP) and other key solutions (including VBMS)
- Benefit Systems (\$44 million): Continued the implementation/development to replace the legacy FAS application used for Chapter 33 and other education benefits. Support the operation of legacy systems supporting VBA operations (VETSNET, CAPRI, FAS, etc.)
- Benefits Appeals (\$13 million): Maintain all the Appeals PL systems such as, Caseflow, ARMS and VACOLS that support the Board of Veteran's Appeals business processes. Support the Appeals Modernization effort by streamlining the end-to-end appeals process and increasing efficiency

Corporate and Memorial Affairs Portfolios

Highlights include:

- Financial and Acquisition Management Modernization (\$123 million): Fully supports VA's transition to iFAMS.
- HR (\$64 million): Implementation of modernized, automated, standardized systems, tools, and capabilities to deliver a world-class workforce.
- General Counsel (\$19 million): Fully funds GCLaws enhancements to ensure compliance with VA security requirements, builds an Accreditation database for Veterans' representatives; provides efficient remote access.
- Memorials Automation and Legacy Replacement (\$44 million): Continue developing a cohesive enterprise system to replace NCA's legacy BOSS-E to facilitate common workflows; provide enterprise solutions for modernization.

The 2022 appropriations bill was signed after budget display for the 2023 budget submission was finalized. 2022 appropriations bill provided \$2.5 billion (\$163 million less than requested) and rescinded \$200 million from prior year unobligated balances.

- \$1.8 billion, a reduction of \$904 million (-34%) from 2022 request (and a reduction of \$741 million (-29.6%) from 2022 appropriated) to continue deployment of the electronic health record solution, including:
 - Provides for the purchase of licenses and activities for additional future medical center deployments, site assessments, training of staff, purchase and installation of computer hardware and interface development.
 - Funds EHRM deployment readiness across VISNs 16, 17, 21, and 22, as well as IT infrastructure investments across VISNs 1, 2, 4, 15, 19, 21, and 23.
 - Evaluating schedule impact of 2022 appropriations and recissions.

 - Increased Office of General Counsel personnel for Appeals Court, employment law, ARP, MISSION & CARES Act (+\$11.8 million).
 - Improvement in HR services, training and diversity program, and establish two alternate operating locations to carry on essential functions during an emergency (+\$7.7 million).
 - Ensure financial system integrity, support audit tasks relating to the new financial system, expand Enhanced Use Lease program and increase staff for resiliency (+\$4.8 million).

Legislative Proposal Highlights

VA proposes 53 legislative changes with discretionary budget impact and 2 legislative changes with mandatory budget impacts. Highlights include:

- Expanding access to Assisted Reproductive Technology (ART), including in vitro fertilization (IVF) and adoption reimbursement to eligible veterans.
- Eliminating copays for contraception-related health care and services
- Lowering out-of-pocket costs for certain mental health care services

2024 Advance Appropriation (AA)

An Advance Appropriation provides an assurance of funding levels two years out, enabling improved planning and ensuring operations in the event of a government shutdown.

VHA Medical Care

 2024 Medical Care Advance Appropriation is \$132.1 billion (with collections), \$9.4 billion, or 7.7% above the 2023 request.

VBA Benefits

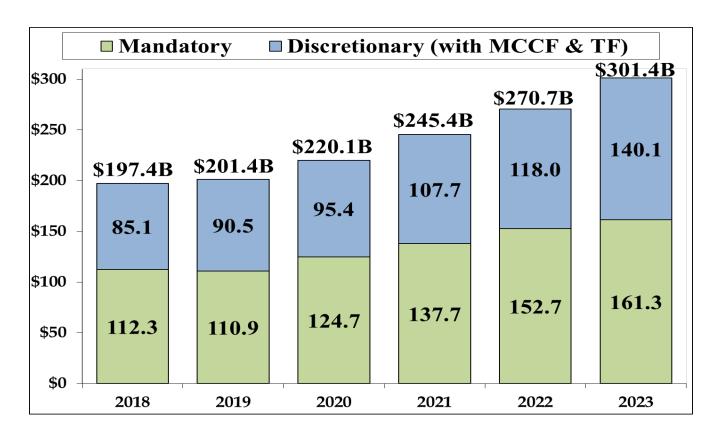
 2024 Advance Appropriation for the mandatory Veterans Benefits programs (Compensation and Pensions, Readjustment Benefits, and Veterans Insurance and Indemnities accounts) is \$155.4 billion, \$5.7 billion, or 3.4% below the 2023 request.

2024 Advance Appropriation request reflects the President's steadfast commitment to Veterans.

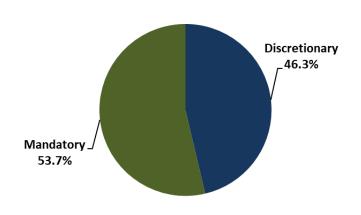

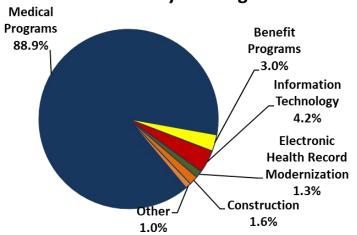

2023 Discretionary/Mandatory Funding





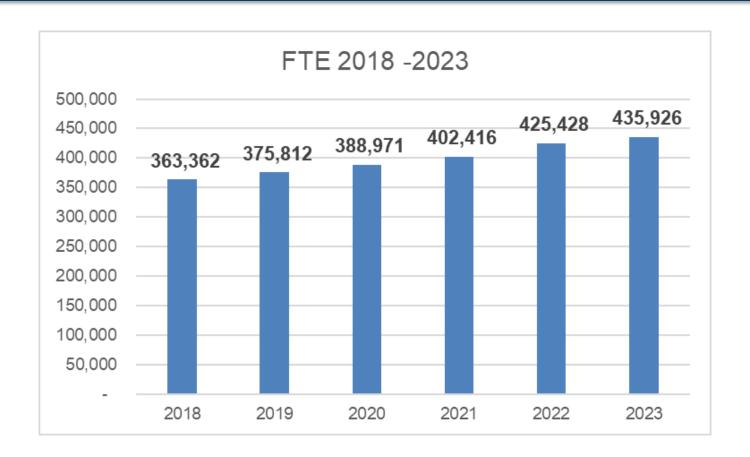

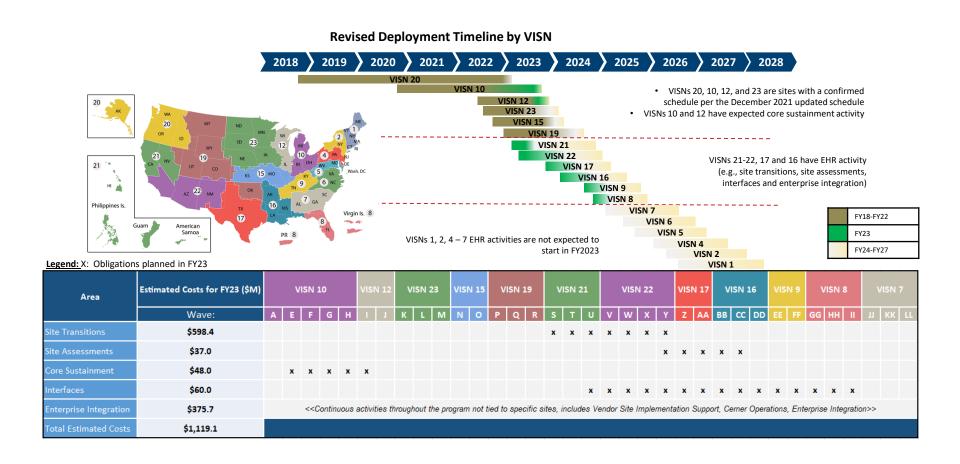

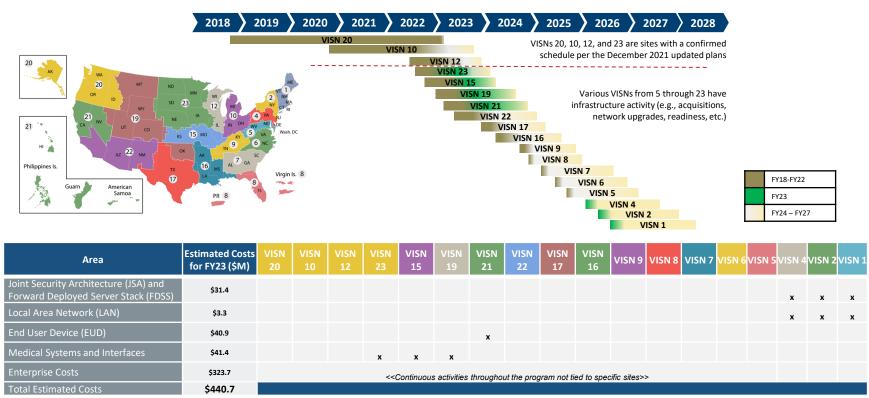

AIR Commission

- "Asset and Infrastructure Review Commission" (the Commission) established by VA MISSION Act of 2018 (PL 115-182), to review VA's recommendations to modernize, or realign VHA facilities, including leased facilities
- This Presidential Commission will conduct public hearings in 2022 and provide a report to the President on the VA's plan along with any additional recommendations from the Commission in 2023
- VA requests \$5 million to support the work of the Commission, including staff, contractual services and travel costs

Transformational Fund

- The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2016 (P.L. 114–113), established a fund permitting VA to transfer unobligated balances of expired non-emergency discretionary funds appropriated with or after P.L. 114–113 (at the end of the fifth fiscal year after the last fiscal year for which such funds are available for the purposes for which appropriated) into the Fund for facilities infrastructure improvements, including nonrecurring maintenance (NRM), at existing hospitals and clinics of the VHA, and information technology systems improvements and sustainment.
- In 2023, VA plans to make the following investments:
 - \$804.5 million for funding three major construction projects and associated line items
 - \$503 million for Portland, OR Upgrade Buildings 100 and 101 Seismic Retrofit and Renovation
 - \$62.5 million for Canandaigua, NY Construction and Renovation
 - \$88.6 million for Fort Harrison, MT Seismic Upgrade and Specialty Care Improvements
 - \$150.4 million for line items
 - \$163.5 million for minor construction projects that improve VHA facilities as well as providing for the installation of zero-emission vehicle charging infrastructure.
