The adjutant general is the military commander of both branches and is appointed by the governor. While serving in a state status the governor serves as the commander in chief. This duty shifts to the president of the United States when forces are federalized for national missions.

The mission of the Utah National Guard is to provide mission-ready military forces to assist both state and federal authorities in times of emergency or war. Since 1894, The Utah National Guard has effectively trained, equipped, and prepared its members to accomplish that mission successfully. FORT DOUGLAS MILITARY MUSEUM - UTAH MILITARY HERITAGE AND HISTORY

Mission Statement: Through exhibits, events, educational programming and publications, the museum seeks to engage and inform the public about Utah's rich military heritage.

Our mission is to preserve and interpret Utah military history; educate visitors about the role of the military in the growth and development of Utah; and to honor all Utahns who have served their country in uniform.

Due to COVID-19 and closure in March 2020, the museum's support and attendance is abnormally low

Total Visitors: Approximately 4,094, typically averaged around 10 to 14,000 visitors in past years.

Total Tours: The museum gives a variety of tours to individuals, families, groups including retirement homes, youth and scout groups, and school groups among others both scheduled and walk ins.

Events: Fort Douglas Cemetery Tour, Fort Douglas Post Cemetery, Salt Lake City. Hosted the states WWII Monument Commission public meeting.

Exhibits: *Internment At Home: The Prison Camp At Fort Douglas*, Merrill-Cazier Library, Utah State University, Logan; *Unsung Heroes - Military Working Dogs*, A. Ray Olpin University Union, University of Utah, Salt Lake City; *Find Your Major*, J. Willard Marriott Library, University of Utah; *A Soldier In Vietnam*, Utah State Capitol, Salt Lake City.

In-house: The museum houses the states collection of military artifacts which is in the thousands of items.

Other: The 2020 State Legislative Session passed House Bill HB 44 officially designating the Fort Douglas Military Museum as the States Military Museum. The Utah National Guard operates the museum with support from the Fort Douglas Military Museum Association. It is Utah's only museum with collections spanning all service branches and eras of military history.



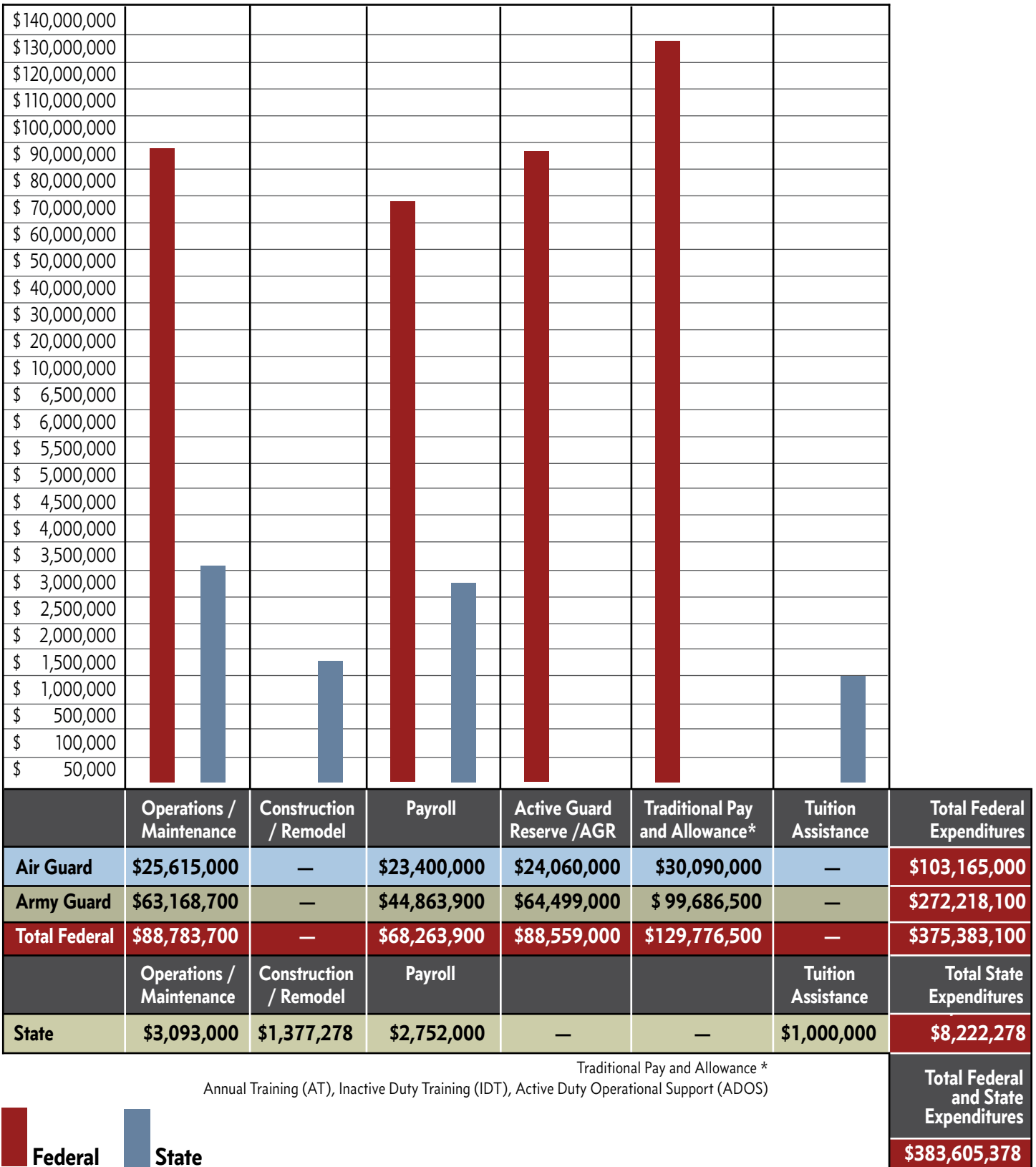

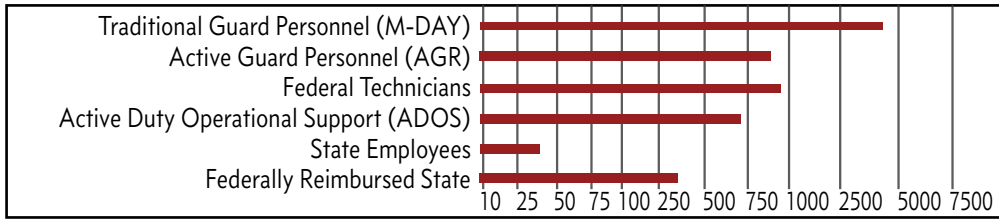


ECONOMIC-IMPACT STATEMENT - 2020 FISCAL YEAR-10/01/2019 to 9/30/2020





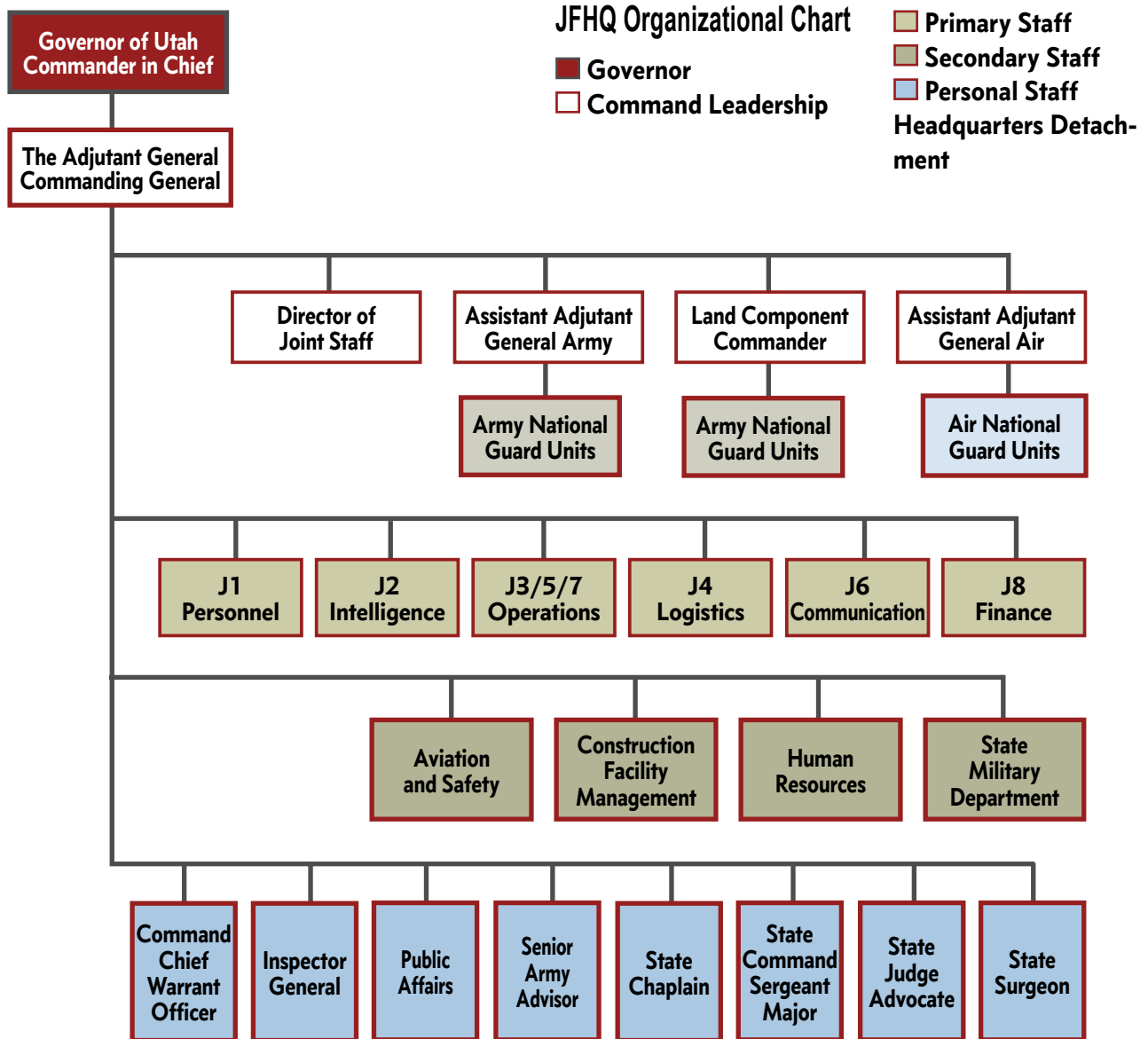
PERSONNEL AND EMPLOYEE DISTRIBUTION - 2020 FY-10/01/2019 to 9/30/2020

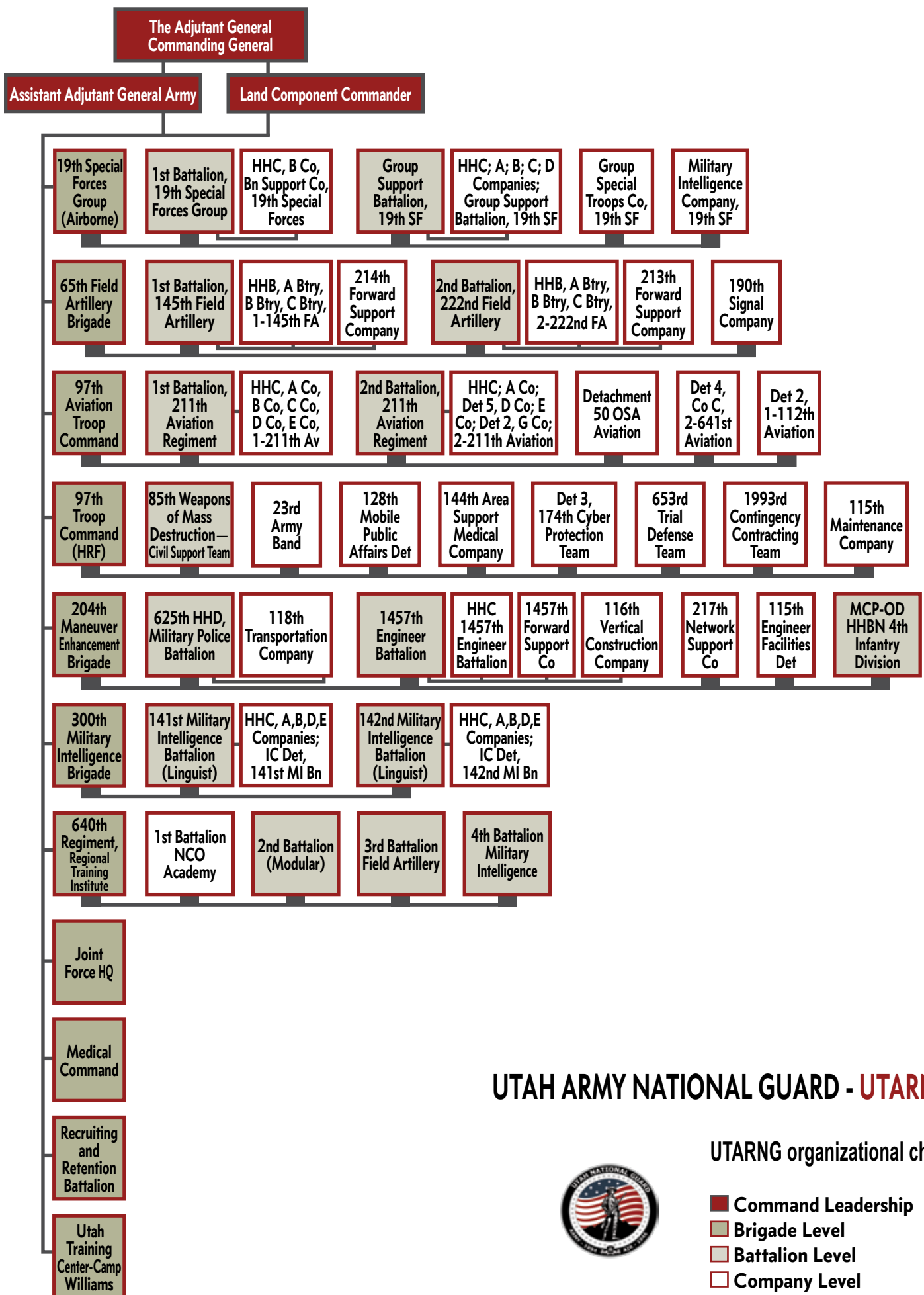

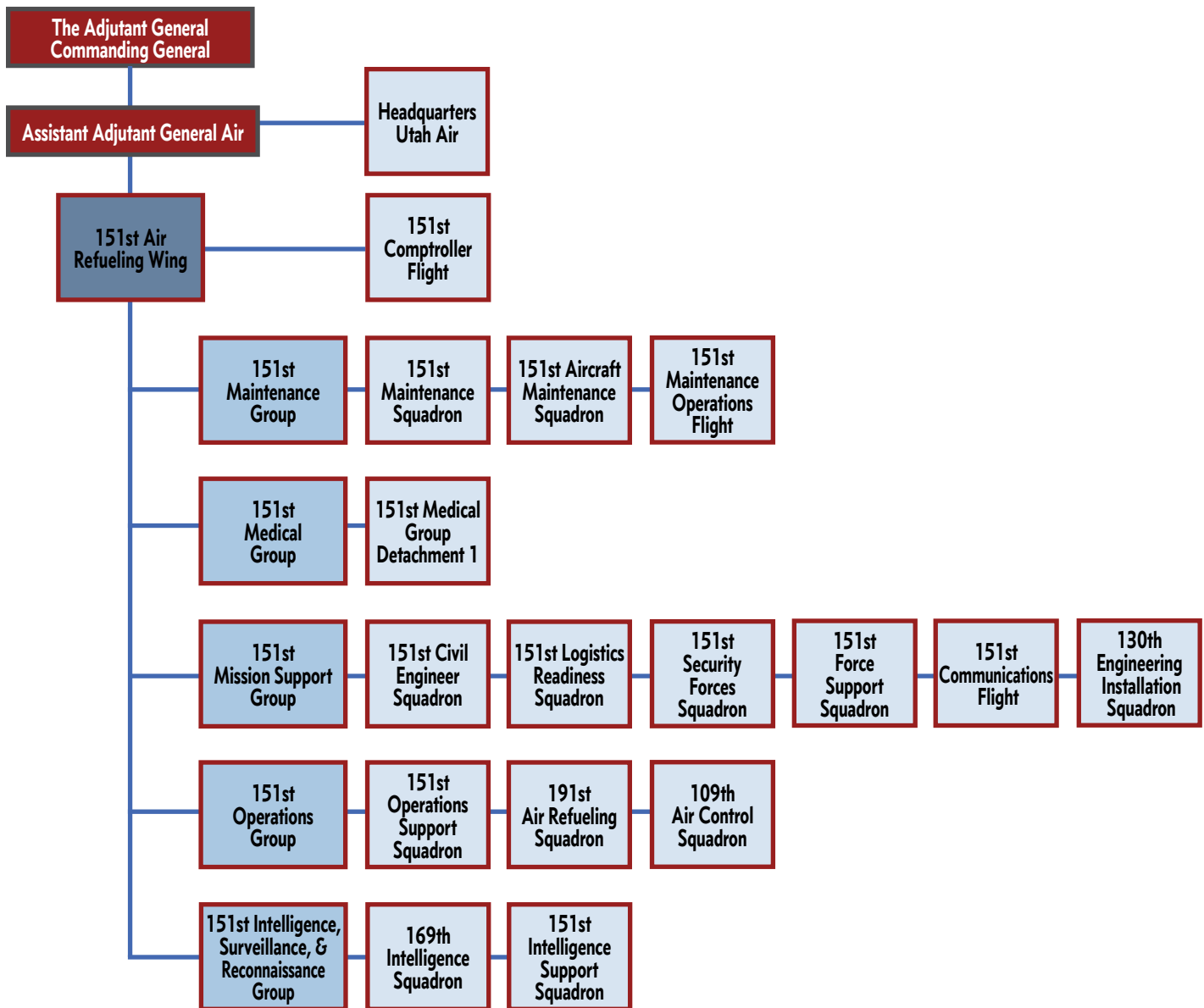
