Organized by geriatric issues, these 2-page documents describe why the issue is important in elder care and include an assessment tool that can be administered in 20 minutes or less. The issues covered are overall assessment tools, functional and mental capacities (ADLs and mental state), depression, pressure sores, sleep, fall risk, nutrition, sexuality, continence, hearing, confusion, caregiver stress, elder abuse, and inappropriate medication.
