This section summarizes information regarding characteristics of the tributary and its adjacent wetlands, if any, and it helps determine whether or not the standards for jurisdiction established under *Rapanos* have been met.

The agencies will assert jurisdiction over non-navigable tributaries of TNWs where the tributaries are “relatively permanent waters” (RPWs), i.e. tributaries that typically flow year-round or have continuous flow at least seasonally (e.g., typically 3 months). A wetland that is adjacent to but that does not directly abut an RPW requires a significant nexus evaluation. If the waterbody<sup>4</sup> is not an RPW, or a wetland directly abutting an RPW, a JD will require additional data to determine if the waterbody has a significant nexus with a TNW. If the tributary has adjacent wetlands, the significant nexus evaluation must consider the tributary in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands. This significant nexus evaluation that combines, for analytical purposes, the tributary and all of its adjacent wetlands is used whether the review area identified in the JD request is the tributary, or its adjacent wetlands, or both. Summarize overall biological, chemical and physical functions being performed: Wetland provides habitat for wildlife, provides flood retention/storage, and filters runoff from upslope agricultural land.

### C. SIGNIFICANT NEXUS DETERMINATION

A significant nexus analysis will assess the flow characteristics and functions of the tributary itself and the functions performed by any wetlands adjacent to the tributary to determine if they significantly affect the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of a TNW. For each of the following situations, a significant nexus exists if the tributary, in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands, has more than a speculative or insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical and/or biological integrity of a TNW. Considerations when evaluating significant nexus include, but are not limited to the volume, duration, and frequency of the flow of water in the tributary and its proximity to a TNW, and the functions performed by the tributary and all its adjacent wetlands. It is not appropriate to determine significant nexus based solely on any specific threshold of distance (e.g. between a tributary and its adjacent wetland or between a tributary and the TNW). Similarly, the fact an adjacent wetland lies within or outside of a floodplain is not solely determinative of significant nexus.

Draw connections between the features documented and the effects on the TNW, as identified in the *Rapanos* Guidance and discussed in the Instructional Guidebook. Factors to consider include, for example:

**B. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS TO SUPPORT JD:** Wetland B lies in a topographic bowl that collects drainage from the immediately surrounding areas. Wetland C is confined to a low area by an access road to the east, highway to the north, and higher elevations to the west and south. Wetland D lies in a topographic bowl that collects runoff from the immediately surrounding agricultural fields. Wetland E is surrounded by areas of higher elevation. There are no possible surface or subsurface hydrologic connections from the wetlands, such as swales, drainage tiles, channels, etc., to any Waters of the U.S. (WOUS). Additionally, there are no known ecologic pathways or connections with any WOUS. Therefore, the wetlands in question are isolated, not susceptible to use in interstate or foreign commerce, and are not considered WOUS.
