Funding Opportunity – BOLD Public Health Programs to Address Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently announced the availability of funding for the BOLD Public Health Programs to Address Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias (CDC-RFA-DP23-0010) to fulfill the BOLD Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Act (P.L. 115-406). These 5-year grants are designed to build public health infrastructure and increase capacity in addressing and preventing Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias (ADRD) and support dementia caregiving, emphasizing social determinants of health. All BOLD activities are designed to improve the health of populations across the lifespan by employing data-driven strategies and aligning CDC's Healthy Brain Initiative State and Local Public Health Partnerships to Address Dementia: The 2018-2023 Road Map and Road Map for Indian Country frameworks. Funding Opportunity - Rural HIV and Aging Challenge

The "\$500,000 Rural HIV and Aging Challenge" is an opportunity created by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Infectious Disease and HIV/AIDS Policy and the Administration for Community Living. Applicants will submit innovative and effective pilot solutions that address the needs of people aging with HIV in rural communities, with a focus on racial and ethnic minorities and LGBTQ+ populations. Examples of possible solutions include:

• identifying HIV and aging service integration interventions including poverty, access to health care services, and education to improve health outcomes;

• reducing socio-economic barriers and improving access to mental health services particularly in rural communities; and

• addressing social determinants of health, particularly wellness through physical activity, nutrition and others that improve overall quality of life.

Effects of the Pandemic on Older Women

"The Impact, Experience, and Challenges of COVID-19: The Women's Health Initiative (WHI)" is a supplemental issue in *The Journals of Gerontology, Series A: Biological Sciences and Medical Sciences* which explores older women's response to and concerns about the COVID-19 pandemic. The issue includes an exploration of how a woman's prior health influenced the degree to which COVID-19 affected their lives. The WHI is a long-term national health study funded by the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute and is focused on examining strategies to prevent the major causes of death, disability, and frailty in older women. Findings from the research for this issue will guide the response to the multifaceted social, psychological, and physical struggles and comorbidities associated with older women living in the era of COVID-19.

Alzheimer's Disease & Dementia

Lowering Risk of Dementia & Alzheimer's with Blood Pressure Medications
New research reported in JAMA Network Open suggests that some antihypertensive
drugs may help decrease adult dementia rates among those who recently have
begun using the medications. Results from a cohort study of 57,000 Medicare beneficiaries
showed a 16% lower risk of Alzheimer's and related dementia, and an 18% lower risk of
vascular dementia in patients taking antihypertensive medications.

Dementia-Friendly Dining with Dignity Program

Restaurants in Tampa Bay, Florida are participating in a **Dementia-Friendly Dining** program to bring some normalcy to the lives of those living with Alzheimer's and dementia. This program is designed help older adults have positive dining experiences with their families. The program's founder worked with memory care organizations to train servers in restaurants on how to interact with people who have dementia.

Needs Assessment Toolkit Available on SNAP-Ed Connection

A new <u>Needs Assessment Toolkit</u> developed by the United States Department of Agriculture aims to assist Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) state agencies to meet program requirements and enhance their existing needs assessment capabilities. The toolkit makes suggestions to increase diversity of voices involved in the needs assessment process and provides strategies to link findings to State goals and SNAP-Ed programming. The purpose of the SNAP-Ed needs assessment and the role of state agencies were discussed in two FNS <u>webinars</u> which include highlights from the Needs Assessment Toolkit and its development.

CDC Announces the Latest Release for PLACES

The <u>latest release for Population Level Analysis and Community Estimates</u> (<u>PLACES</u>) provides model-based estimates of population health data on 29 chronic disease-related indicators at all 4 U.S. geographic levels: counties, incorporated and census-designated places, census tracts, and ZIP Code Tabulation Areas. This new release contains a data dictionary table and new how-to videos. PLACES provides nationwide data on chronic disease conditions, behavioral risk factors, and health outcomes. These data can be used to understand the burden and geographic distribution of health risk factors and diseases, identify health disparities and emerging health problems, and inform public health action through the development and implementation of effective prevention policies and programs.

Two Programs Successfully Helping Younger Caregivers
In 2020, there were over 5.4 million caregivers under age 18 in the United
States and 290,000 identified in public schools in Florida alone. These younger
caregivers are often juggling the responsibilities of school with the important role they
have caring for a loved one. Studies show that younger caregivers have a higher prevalence
of anxiety and depression than their non-caregiving peers. The Caregiving Youth
Institute was founded in response to the rising number of younger caregivers and hosts
conferences for community members and professionals. The Caregiving Youth Project
(CYP) of the American Association of Caregiving Youth is a no-cost school-based
program in Palm Beach County that provides comprehensive services to younger
caregivers in 35 middle and high schools. The CYP supports students by offering tutoring,
respite, mentoring, counseling, referrals to appropriate community partners, and
awarding community service hours for caregiving to high school students.

Boosting the Mental/Behavioral Health Infrastructure to Prevent Elder Suicide

Suicide is a serious public health issue with nearly 46,000 Americans in 2020 dying by suicide. More than one third of people who die by suicide are age 55 or older. Older adults are less likely to be assessed for suicidal risk due to ageism and the belief that suicidal thoughts are an expected reaction to aging. This assumption contributes to suicide risk in older adults and blocks access to care. Two strong predictors of suicidal thinking are perceived burdensomeness (on family or close friends due to disability and loss of functioning) and thwarted belonginess (feeling of alienation from others). Reducing ageist beliefs alongside increasing knowledge of aging and training in issues related to older adulthood could prove beneficial in boosting detection and intervention for suicide among older adults.

Advancing Health Equity with Data

In a recent blog post, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation highlights <u>four databases</u> and tools that researchers, policymakers and community leaders can use to <u>improve health outcomes in their communities</u>. These tools can help leaders understand how neighborhoods influence child health and wellbeing, health at the local level in comparison to other communities across the nation, estimated life expectancy, and

learn how policies impact population health and health equity.

Reducing Inappropriate Use of Antipsychotic Medications

As part of the continuing efforts under President Biden's initiative to improve nursing home transparency, safety and quality, and accountability, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) announced <u>new actions to reduce the inappropriate use of antipsychotic medications</u>. This effort will help bring greater transparency about nursing home citations to families. CMS will begin conducting targeted, off-site audits to determine whether nursing homes are accurately assessing and coding individuals with a schizophrenia diagnosis.

Social Isolation Associated with Dementia

Using data from the National Health and Aging Trends Study, researchers have found that **social isolation among older adults is associated with a greater dementia risk**. Being socially isolated was associated with a higher hazard of incident dementia over 9 years among 5,022 older adults.
