On September 27, 2022, the Office of Disaster Assistance and Petroleum Management (ODAPM) held an opening ceremony for the First Annual Amerika Samoa Disaster Resilience Summit at the Rex H. Lee Auditorium in Utulei.

Special Remarks were delivered by Acting Governor, Honorable Fainu'ulelei Falefatu Alailima-Uti:

The Disaster Resilience Summit is a three day summit focused on strengthening American Samoa community preparedness, response and recovery efforts to ensure safety and resiliency during all hazard disasters. "This year's theme is '*Bridging the gap between Government and Communities*.' The goal is to generate a dialogue between the government and the people, and provide an opportunity for both to share information in this capacity," stated Director Lisa.

Over twenty outreach educational booths and training sessions from local and federal partners, departments, and agencies were set up around the auditorium site to engage students, members of the community, and government leaders in their emergency support functions, roles and responsibilities in times of disasters.

A Memorial Prayer Service will be held on September 29, to commemorate those who have lost their lives 13 years ago during the 2009 Tsunami disaster.
