

How Hiring Veterans Supports Ending Veteran Homelessness

Permanent, stable housing is the benchmark of efforts to end homelessness among Veterans, but housing alone may not be enough. Unemployment is cited as the third leading cause of homelessness in the United States, according to <u>USICH</u>. Employment can be a key element in helping Veterans climb out of homelessness or avoid it all together.



BENEFITS OF EMPLOYMENT FOR VETERANS

<u>Studies show</u> that gainful employment at a livable wage, with opportunities for advancement, is the foundation for maintaining economic stability and reducing the risk of becoming homeless. Employment provides:

- Income that is key to economic well-being.
- Greater social interaction and connections that can reduce isolation and build social capital.
- A sense of personal efficacy and social integration that contributes to life satisfaction.

- Pre-screening and referring Veterans with a variety of skill sets from all educational levels.
- Assisting Veterans in applying their military experiences to civilian employment.

VA created <u>Homeless Veterans Community Employment Services (HVCES)</u> to provide employment services and resources to Veterans participating in VA homeless programs to increase access to permanent housing and improve housing stability. This is accomplished both through the provision of direct services and by providing a bridge to employment opportunities and resources provided by VA and non-VA partners.

HVCES is staffed by Vocational Development Specialists who function as Community Employment Coordinators (CECs) and Employment Specialists. <u>Community Employment Coordinators</u> are funded at nearly all VA medical centers nationwide.

of Veterans were employed while housed and receiving case management within HUD-VASH¹, exceeding the national target by more than 5%. of Veterans who exited a GPD² residential program were employed, exceeding the national target by 8%. newly documented instances of employment for Veterans engaged with or who exited from VA homeless programs or services. Veterans were employed either full- or part-time/ temporary at exit from all VA homeless programs and services.
